

Anton Infant School Art and Design Progression Overview

Intent

At Anton Infant School, we aim to provide pupils with a high-quality art curriculum, which develops creativity, sets challenges, engages and inspires children and equips them with the knowledge and skills to experiment, invent and create their works of art, craft and design.

Learning within art, craft and design stimulates imagination, enhancing learning across the curriculum. It provides visual, tactile and sensory experiences and a special way of understanding and responding to the world. A high-quality art and design education should inspire, engage and challenge children - enabling pupils to communicate what they see, feel and think through colour, texture, form and pattern.

Implementation

Art is taught through specific skills-based lessons and cross-curricular opportunities, where children are inspired by exciting and engaging topics and themes and are introduced to real-world artists, including famous artists from the past and modern-day artists.

Children make careful observations of the world around them and learn to represent what they see using a range of media and techniques.

Through observations of artists' work, children reflect and express opinions. They learn to look in detail and recognise different forms within the artwork.

The Creation Station provides a dedicated space for children to be creative, there is a wide range of art supplies to select from enabling them to learn how different materials can be used and combined.

Through our Forest School environment, children have the opportunity to be creative within their environment, using natural resources and art supplies.

Intended impact

Through Art and Design the children will learn:

- to select from and use a range of tools and media to use their imagination, develop skills and create pieces of artwork that they share with others
- to provide feedback through peer assessment
- to self-reflect and assess their work
- show a progression of skills within the children's sketchbooks
- confidence to use a range of materials to produce drawings, paintings, sculptures and mixed media work
